## **EID Ear Tags**

The new ear tagging regulations come into force on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2009 and it is intended to advise members of the changes nearer the time.

As far as the tags themselves are concerned, electronic tags must be yellow, while the original non-electronic tag in double tagged sheep can be any colour other than yellow, black (unless using a bolus for EID), or red. Red will be retained for replacement tags for sheep not born on your holding, while black tags will be used as the secondary identifier where an electronic bolus has been used.

The new tags will contain your existing UK flock number, preceded by a '0', followed by a five digit individual number, for example, UK 0 123456 00001. Eblex, NFU, National Sheep Association and the Livestock Auctioneers Association will be issuing guidance in the next few weeks

## **Hendra Vean Cotswolds**

The Hendra Vean flock, which is now based near New Quay on the Ceredigion coast in West Wales, was originally established in 1996 when we had the opportunity to buy a paddock at the rear of the property where we were living in Surrey. We were keen to have a rare breed and the choice came down to Wensleydale or Cotswold and Lyn Gibbings suggested that we visited Guiting Power Farm Park to compare the two breeds; I am afraid that there was no contest and the Cotswolds won.



Having bought the first four lambs from Bob Palmer we had to find a ram, and fortunately Crawley Borough Council decided that they no longer wanted to keep their trio of Cotswold sheep and we bought the lot, including an Oxford Down, for £100. The ram was Cookbury Egor for which they paid £525 at the rare breed sale in 1992 and I have to say that he was superb. He was large and gentle and many of our ewes can be traced back to him.

In early 2000 we decided that we wanted to move to Wales and we spent the next four years trying to find a suitable farm; but in the meantime we deliberately grew our the flock size and for a couple of years Nick Cordery kindly looked after a number of our ewes. Finally in 2004 we moved to Wales and followed a different way of life.

Since moving here the flock has changed and whilst we now have about 45 to 50 breeding ewes, we have also been able to improve the quality. This is due to the helpful advice we have received from Steve Parkes and Davina Stanhope, such that this year we have had difficulty deciding how few replacement ewe lambs to retain. In terms of flock policy those ewes that do not produce good lambs or that show undesirable characteristics, are culled.

With the size of the flock, which is the largest in Wales, we have been able to diversify and last year we had the wool spun and made into throws, scarves, cushions and other knitwear. This year the fleeces have been made into Aran and Double Knit knitting wool. The mill we use to process the fleeces is only 10 miles from us, thus the carbon footprint is minimal. If anyone is contemplating having their fleeces made into knitwear such as we have produced, our experience is that there is a considerable financial outlay and you need a large number of fleeces for however good your flock is there will always be fleeces that cannot be used.

At the moment we are concentrating on the woollen goods, but we are pondering whether to introduce a box meat scheme. Consequently, at present, those lambs, which are not retained for replacements are sold at the local mart and that is only 12 miles away.

This year we were particularly pleased with the lamb crop with only 3 deaths (two of which were due to toxoplasmosis) out of 67; this equates to 4% and according to the NSA the national average is 15%. Having written this next year will probably be a disaster – but that is sheep for you!!

## **Cotswolds in Wales**

Cotswolds, like all sheep, do not enjoy wet weather (a bit like people) and although we get our fair share of rain in this area, the sheep do not seem to suffer unduly. Having said that we have to be aware of the dangers of liver fluke and take appropriate action, particularly as a couple of the fields are poorly drained, but we intend to rectify that in the next two years.

Also associated with the wetter climate is the problem associated with cutting hay. For the past three years we have not made hay, but generally it is possible to make big bale haylage and with our size of flock there is no difficulty of it going off except immediately prior to lambing when the ewes do not want to eat much.

## **Final Comment**

When our vet prepared the Animal Health Plan as part of the Welsh Lamb and Beef Producers Farm Assured Scheme he commented “Hendra Vean Cotswolds are doing a tremendous job of promoting and improving an important rare breed”. I might be biased, but I agree with him.

### **The Eastern States Show at Springfield, Massachusetts, USA**

I accepted Kim Caulfield’s kind invitation to be a guest speaker at the Show, to talk about my research into the origins of the Golden Fleece and also the Medieval wool trade in England and the Italian connections.

I had a most enjoyable trip, met many enthusiastic Cotswold sheep breeders and made some good friends in the course of my trip, which was very much a learning experience for me, especially as it was my first trip to America.

The Cotswold Show was on Saturday Sept 27<sup>th</sup>, and my talk was the following day, so as I had arrived earlier in the week, Kim had arranged for me to be taken around New England to see some places of interest.

My first trip was with Anne McIntyre-Lahner, who keeps Romneys, and we went to visit Old Surbridge Village which is a Museum and learning resource of New England rural life during America’s early years, 1790-1840, showing how the settlers built their new nation. It was fascinating and most enjoyable. Next day was spent with Dr Max Crossman, we went to Plymouth on the Atlantic coast to the place where the early settlers had landed at Plymouth

Rock. Also there was a replica of the famous Mayflower ship which we went on board to inspect and it was really quite small to have crossed the Atlantic with all those people, they must have been very brave!. This replica ship had sailed to America from England originally in 1957 and one of the crew had been a descendant of the original Mayflower's crew. We had a great day out, and I know Max is well known to Norman and Kate Kay.

The next three days I spent at the Show ground, there was so much to see and do.

I was very impressed by all the events and how the many young people who participated are encouraged. They are all so very enthusiastic and this must auger well for the future. I feel sure there are some things we can learn from the Americans with this and also with their fund raising ideas.

The Cotswold sheep I saw were in many ways different to ours here in the UK. It must also be remembered that I can only make comments on the sheep I saw and unfortunately Kim Caulfield was not able to take her sheep to the Show, as she had imported semen from English rams in 1997 and it would have been interesting to see what effect this may have had on her sheep.



The sheep I saw at the Show had some marked differences to our British sheep and I believe this may well have been a natural response of the sheep to the extremes of climate to be found in America. The intense heat found in many of the Southern states means they have to be shorn twice a year to survive it, and the fleeces on many of the sheep I saw has changed from being long and crimped, to being short to medium ringlets, which hang loose and open, which I think would help to allow air to circulate around the skin. I was delighted to see Max Crossman's fleece had won a first prize in the fleece competition, and later I handled this fleece, and although I did not know its exact weight, it must have been about 3lbs, it may have also have been only 6 months growth or less.

One of the two American Cotswold sheep Associations also allow Black Cotswold's to be registered and shown, and they have their own classes. The black fleeces seem to be in demand from spinners.

I learned from one breeder that he had bought a small flock of Coloured (black) Cotswold Ewes and a Coloured Ram hoping for a good crop of Coloured lambs, to his surprise, every lamb born was pure white!

There was a very large entry for the show and whilst the White Cotswold's were in the majority, there was also a substantial entry of the Coloured (black) Cotswold's being shown in their separate classes.

Many of the sheep have their fleeces trimmed right back just prior to showing, to accentuate their profile and conformation, this does then leave very little wool to be seen, but I was told the wool only makes up a small proportion of the judges' marks. The outline and conformation appear to be paramount.

I thought that the senior rams had excellent length, quite similar to ours, but the ewes were perhaps a little smaller, and the faces on the ewes were much shorter on the sheep I saw than ours.

I did take with me some photographs of my sheep and the American members were amazed at the greenness and depth of our grass, which of course plays a most important part in the growth of our sheep and the type of wool we produce, and this will help to explain the size variations in British and American flocks. I think that we maybe sometimes forget how lucky we are to have such a temperate climate here!

Members spoke to me of their fond memories of Joe Henson's visit some years ago.

I am greatly indebted to Kim Caulfield for all her hard work to ensure my stay was so enjoyable, her mother Jane, Max and Chris Caulfield, and Anne McIntyre- Lahner. I had the pleasure of meeting a fellow speaker, Dr Elizabeth Wayland-Barber, a writer of many best selling books in America who gave a fascinating speech about the Ancient History of Textiles.

I found everyone, without exception, most helpful and they lived up to, and exceeded their reputation for hospitality and made my visit so enjoyable.
